
Why Italy?

Academic Programs

Study Abroad Programs

Academic Semester and Year Abroad

Long-term programs are customizable based on students' academic needs and personal interests. LdM suggests students register for one course in Italian language, as these classes provide students with tools for navigating Italy and are part of the traditional study abroad experience. Additionally, semester students are eligible for credit-bearing internships in various fields of study, from Art History to Communications and Design.

Semester Internships

Italy is known for artisanal and small business structures. By dedicating 12 hours per week to an LdM partner company or organization, students gain familiarity with common characteristics of an Italian workplace while balancing a full semester of credits. LdM interns can obtain lifelong skills, cultivate relationships, and enhance resumes that help them compete in the global marketplace. Please note that placement opportunities are limited and are unpaid.

Two Italies Program

Instead of concentrating an entire semester in either Florence or Tuscania, experience both LdM sites with the Two Italies program! Living and studying in the city before transferring to the Italian countryside, students learn to recognize local and regional differences, and gain a more complex understanding of contemporary Italy. A set schedule of five courses introduces students to Italian language and culture. Florence's ancient roots, wine business and marketing, philosophical and psychological approaches to the subject of happiness, and global development of sustainable food sources. This program is ideal for undergraduates who want to fulfill general education requirements abroad.

Summer Sessions

In the summertime, LdM offers two shorter sessions, each consisting of month-long courses. Choose the Florence or Tuscania session that works better for your schedule, either June or July. Alternatively, students may combine the two sessions to maximize their summer study abroad in Italy.

January Intersession

The shortest of LdM programs, this two-week program in Florence is open to undergraduate and independent students, as well as lifelong learners. Capitalize on the winter break by enrolling in one or two courses that complement your international adventures in Tuscany's capital city, the "Jewel of the Renaissance."

Special Summer Programs

Available in both Florence and Tuscania, these 4-week intensive experiences balance academic instruction with hands-on practice.

Archaeology Field School

Dig into a professional excavation environment while learning about ancient Etruscan culture and archaeological methods. Conducted in partnership with LdM's long-time partner CAMNES (Center for Ancient Mediterranean and Near Eastern Studies), students will be led by a team of Italian archaeologists into Tuscania's necropolises, or cities of the dead, and delicately uncover artifacts dating back 2,500 years. This year, Italian students will participate as part of a collaboration with Università di Napoli Federico II.

Summer Conservation Workshop

Learn how to directly apply the most appropriate conservation and restoration techniques to authentic works of art in their historical Italian locations. Students practice the creative and scientific skills necessary to travel into the field and work in hands-on sessions that focus on original easel paintings, frescoes and wooden artifacts from past centuries. This workshop begins at the LdM restoration lab in Florence and continues at an off-site location in Italy for the remainder of the course. Past locations include ancient towns in Tuscany, Umbria, Calabria, and on the island of Capraia. This course is open to all levels and offers the unique opportunity to learn in a professional studio setting as well as the chance to study in an authentic Italian town.

Stop-Motion Workshop

This newly introduced workshop introduces students to the cinematic art of stop-motion animation and takes place at the renowned Misseri Studio located in the stunning Castle of Montalbo in the nearby hills of Florence. Through hands-on learning, students learn the basics of creating stop-motion, such as creating and building characters, developing a storyboard, filming techniques, and post-production editing. While studying the evolving television and online market, and analyzing professional opportunities in the industry, students will also work as part of a team to create their own unique animations.





Certificate Programs

Summer Certificates

These programs were carefully designed to meet increasing demand for on-site educational opportunities that emphasize career readiness within structured yet flexible plans of short-term study. Addressing specific and relevant themes, Summer Certificates deliver a powerful advantage for those who are eager to progress along certain career paths. Subjects include: Branding, Global Sustainability, Human Creativity, and Wine Business & Culture.

AIM Certificate Program

This semester certificate program is designed for highly motivated students majoring in Communications or Media, and for those with a serious interest in how media affects every aspect of our modern life. The AIM Certificate (Applied Integrated Media) program gives students a broad overview of all aspects of media and communications, as well as the larger cultural, political, and financial world in which they exist. The program consists of four parts: three related courses as well as required workshops with industry professionals. There are no prerequisites to enroll and students should integrate the AIM program within their studies to maintain full-time student status at LdM.

One-Semester Certificates

Semester Certificates offer students an opportunity to gather the professional skills and theoretical underpinnings of exciting fields.
Subjects include: Architecture in Urban Context, Balance in Nutrition, Interior Design in Contemporary Living, Italian Gastronomy, Product Design Towards Sustainability, Fashion Sustainability, Global Luxury, and Visual Communication for Fashion.

One-Year and Professional/ Advanced Certificates

Long-term certificates develop student creativity, artistic talent, and technical skills within intentionally structured plans of study.

Marist-LdM Programs

These fully accredited, four-year degree programs offer the unique experience of extended undergraduate study at an Italian international institution. Marist-LdM Venice Biennale Program

This biennial summer program invites students to visit the famous visual art exhibition, La Biennale di Venezia. Academics focus on studio art and the prominent role that Italy plays in the contemporary art world.









Florence

Florence is the capital of the Tuscany region and home to approximately one-third of the world's art treasures. Living and studying in the birthplace of the Renaissance is an unparalleled experience! Walking to classes in Florence's historical center, the entirety of which is declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site, LdM students enjoy jewels of the city, marvel at its beauty, and make meaningful memories every day.



Study in Style

LdM buildings are situated in the San Lorenzo district, next to the bustling market and ancient church.

The LdM Florence campus comprises 16 properties peppered among the iconic Duomo, artisanal gelaterias, and the legacies of great scientists and artists of human history. In addition, LdM partners with the University of Florence, enabling students to complete STEM coursework in the same laboratory facilities utilized by Italian university students.

LdM students will appreciate a full range of facilities: Wi-Fi equipped classrooms, specialized art and design studios, modern culinary labs, a courtyard garden, a library, and a computer center. In addition, the always delicious LdM Cafeteria offers affordable meal plans, frothy cappuccinos, and a cozy space where students can gather or collect their thoughts between classes.

Delight in Culinary Arts

LdM's main building neighbors a lively Florence landmark: Mercato Centrale, one of the oldest indoor markets in town. Since its opening in 1874, locals have depended on this historic public market for the fresh, colorful ingredients commonly used in Tuscan cuisine. In the newly restructured food hall on the second floor, among contemporary culinary vendors, students and tourists alike can discover Cucina LdM, a modern kitchen with 16 professional workstations equipped with state of-the-art appliances and utensils.

Thanks to LdM's partnership with Mercato Centrale, everyone is invited to learn from Cucina LdM's wonderful instructional chefs, who explain both the history and chemistry of each ingredient, thus allowing pupils to recognize what makes Italian cuisine so special.

Immerse Yourself in Aesthetic

Florence is a favorite destination for high street fashion, architecture, and style. Luxury brands, from Ferragamo and Gucci to Cavalli and Pucci, have made the city a fashion capital of the world, and Florence enjoys a reputation for quality craftsmanship and design. LdM welcomes students of all disciplines to deepen their understanding of fine arts, design industries, and Italy's commanding monuments through a variety of introductory, intermediate, and advanced courses.

Curiosity and creativity are not restricted to students who major in art and design; so for those who always wanted the opportunity to roam Renaissance palaces and admire Michelangelo's David at close range, studying with LdM is truly the chance of a lifetime!

Exhibit with LdM Gallery

Studying in Florence, students breathe beauty and find it around every corner and within the LdM Gallery. Here, programming often focuses on student perspectives with exhibitions that feature the most exciting and profound interdisciplinary art and design

projects by LdM's very own students. Encouraging the development of students' creativity and sophistication, the gallery's main goals are artistic experimentation and dialogue. Frequent exhibitions generate open discussion with the public and offer students the chance to experience professional realities of the art world beyond an institutional setting.

Visit Fondazione Franco Zeffirelli

In 2018, LdM began a rewarding collaboration with Fondazione Franco Zeffirelli - International Center for Performing Arts. The Center aims to make the heritage of Franco Zeffirelli's 70-year career available to future generations, Florentine and international alike.

Courses in the performing arts, film and media arts, and literature are jointly offered by LdM and Fondazione Zeffirelli inside the beautiful Palazzo San Firenze, a 17th-century baroque architectural treasure.

Zeffirelli is known world-wide for cinematic masterpieces, such as Academy Award nominated Romeo and Juliet (1968) and Taming of the Shrew (1967). Affectionately nicknamed II Maestro (The Master), he was a modern-day Renaissance man who also directed theater and opera productions at acclaimed institutions ranging from La Scala in Milan to the Met Opera in New York.



Tuscania

Tuscania is a hilltop town located in the Lazio region of central Italy, part of the breathtaking countryside of the Maremma coastlands. Given Tuscania's smaller size and its unique geography, students can live and study in a typical Italian environment, while interacting closely with the local community. LdM students maximize study-life balance because Tuscania makes the perfect base for a great range of cultural and outdoor recreational activities.

Surrounded by Serenity

Tuscania is in the Lazio region and known for its natural beauty. Cultivated fields, abundant orchards, rows of olive trees, lush vineyards and fragrant fields of lavender offer the ever-changing charm of a landscape that boasts a brilliant color palette throughout the seasons. Surrounded by unforgettable scenery, students can learn about Etruscan history in proximity to ancient ruins. Etruscan civilization predated the Roman Empire by more than 800 years, and the only surviving Etruscan constructions draw curious archaeologists and researchers to Tuscania from all over the world.

A Close-knit Community

LdM Tuscania is often described by students as a very warm campus where students easily get to know one another as well as the faculty and staff. All classrooms and student facilities are housed in one large building that is nestled inside medieval walls that encircle the tranguil town. Just down the street is the local bakery, where students regularly find themselves engaged in friendly conversation with local residents while choosing a loaf of freshly baked bread. Tuscania's neighbors are eager to meet LdM students and encourage Italian language learners. LdM's sister site of Tuscania is a great fit for students who are interested in connecting with Italians, practicing language skills, and learning about Italian culture in a peaceful, low-stress environment.

Outdoor Adventure

At LdM Tuscania, students can choose from a wide variety of well-being initiatives and sport activities, which facilitate relationship building with the natural and cultural environments. For example, Lake Bolsena, the largest volcanic lake in all of Europe, gives students access to dark sand beaches, swimming, waterfront cafés, and boat rentals. In addition, the sparkling Tyrrhenian Sea is a short 30-minute ride away. Students can participate in hiking excursions around Vulci Archaeological Park, pick fruit and vegetables at local orchards, or take a dip in one of the many hot springs in the area, where water temperatures range from 30-42° Celsius (86-107° Fahrenheit)!

Getting Around

The nation's capital, Rome, is just a train ride away from Tuscania, and LdM staff make it easy for students to reach the Eternal City! Free transfers from LdM Tuscania to the nearest train station in Tarquinia are available on Thursdays and Fridays, and Rome's Fiumicino Airport is approximately 1.5 hours away by train. On Sundays, students can arrive at the Tarquinia train station for a free return transfer back to Tuscania. With complimentary logistical support, students gain confidence planning weekend trips and participating in LdM-organized excursions to major cities as well as ancient towns, such as Viterbo, Orvieto, and Civita di Bagnoregio.

Sustainability by Example

Tuscania is an unmatched location for the study of sustainable agriculture and the farm-to-table lifestyle. Seated among fertile hills rich in produce and Etruscan heritage, Tuscania has a mild Mediterranean climate in which agricultural activity takes place nearly year-round. Balancing traditional techniques and technology-inspired innovations, farmers obtain high quality food products while demonstrating deep respect for the environment. Extracting golden oil from their own olive trees and tending their own fields using organic methods that prioritize quality over quantity, Tuscania's families take pride in living off their own produce. In Italy, you will taste the difference.



Housing

Studying abroad can be transformative and requires students to adjust to a new way of life in a different country. LdM makes this transition easier by offering a range of housing services for those who choose Italy as their home away from home.

LdM Applicants who secure housing through LdM are given the opportunity to express preferences as well as needs in their LdM Housing Application. The LdM Housing Services staff works diligently to take this information into consideration and accommodate requests, including roommate and apartment-mate requests, whenever possible.

Prior to program start, the following information is provided via email:

- · Housing address
- Assigned roommates and/or apartment-mates
- Details for Housing Check-In
- Up-to-date travel instructions for arriving in Italy

To maintain this standard, students who opt into LdM housing receive emergency contact information, for use in the event of an urgent housing issue outside of business hours. Additionally, students receive guidelines for safety and well-being that address Italian housing laws, the importance of locking doors, recovery of lost keys, information about utilities and proper ventilation, and instructions for enjoying Italy's advanced waste collection and recycling systems.

Student Apartments

Students attending LdM have the option to live in shared apartments. This is the most popular housing option and is ideal for those who want to live a more independent lifestyle.

Apartments in Italy, especially in the historic centers, are situated in antique buildings. Most often, Italian apartments are on the second floor (or higher) within buildings that do not have elevator access.

The apartments used by LdM are located in different buildings across Florence and Tuscania, all within walking distance of the school.

Each apartment is unique, so students can expect LdM apartments to vary in appearance, style, configuration, lighting, size/number of bedrooms, size/features of common space or living areas, and/or size/features of the kitchen. All LdM apartments are non-smoking.

A standard LdM apartment assignment consists of a double occupancy bedroom (two single beds in the same room) within a shared apartment. Single occupancy bedrooms within a shared apartment are available upon request but limited in number; therefore, students should remain open to placement in a double occupancy bedroom.

Due to the surge in demand in Florence's housing market over the last few years, LdM informs those students interested in LdM Housing that alternative student housing options may need to be used to accommodate housing requests, when necessary. These facilities have been vetted by LdM and provide students with both comfort and safety.



Homestays

LdM students also have the option to live in a homestay with local Italians. This housing option is ideal for those who want to practice the language and learn about Italian family life and customs.

Students who want to live and bond with Italians enjoy the homestays arranged by LdM. Living with a host or host family has linguistic and cultural benefits, not to mention the homemade Italian cooking.

As part of an Italian household, students directly participate in Italian daily life and build relationships with their hosts.

They are involved in everyday routines and traditions, from holidays to birthday celebrations.

Homestays are recommended to LdM students who are committed to learning Italian. The combination of formal language lessons and homebased practice with native speakers is an authentic, effective means to better understand Italian culture.

Most Italians live in apartments, so students can expect to live in apartment-style housing, and apartment features will vary by placement. Like the student apartment housing option, LdM homestay assignments typically consist of a double occupancy bedroom within a shared apartment. Single occupancy bedrooms within a shared apartment are available upon request but limited in number.

Upon arrival in Italy, LdM's 24/7 emergency phone number is shared during orientation in case a student needs to speak with an advisor for any urgent reason outside of business hours. Mental health services are also available to LdM students at no additional cost, and appointments with certified counselors are easily booked online.

Cafeteria

At the LdM Florence main building, students can enjoy freshly cooked meals, including daily vegetarian options. A meal plan card of 10 meals plus one free meal is available.

LdM Tuscania offers students a student card which provides discounts at some local cafes and restaurants.

Student Point

All LdM sites offer students free access to computing and internet facilities as well as wireless internet connectivity.

Library

LdM's libraries enable students to complete their coursework successfully. The ever-growing collections have been built to cater directly to the needs of students and the subjects they study at LdM's different campuses. Students can consult books in the reading rooms and a limited number of books may be checked out.

Italian Language and Culture

Excursions

In addition to local activities, LdM also organizes day trips and overnight excursions that allow students to explore all that Italy has to offer. These faculty-led trips are a great way to discover new destinations while creating lifelong memories with fellow students. Transportation, accommodation, and ticket entry fees to scheduled visits are included in the price so as to facilitate convenience. During the course of their studies, students receive the field trip schedule with instructions on how to reserve a spot. Past examples include trips to Venice, Rome, the Amalfi coast, Cinque Terre, and the Italian Alps. Additionally, LdM holds classes on a Monday to Thursday schedule which makes it even easier to plan weekend getaways. Just don't forget to bring your camera!




Weekend trips and shuttle service at LdM Tuscania

LdM Tuscania offers regular excursions to nearby towns like Viterbo and Orvieto, to the lovely volcanic Lake of Bolsena, and to seaside resorts in Lazio and Tuscany. In this way, students learn to use the local bus system, which enables them to plan their own trips to other destinations.

Weekends in Rome and Florence are easily facilitated. Free transfers on Thursdays or Fridays to Tarquinia station are offered. From there, students can easily reach via train the international Fiumicino Airport of Rome. On Sundays, students can return to Tarquinia train station for a free transfer back to Tuscania.

Volunteering & Professional Opportunities

LdM students can volunteer to learn through service with local community organizations, such as food banks, clothing distribution centers, and primary schools. If the thought of building relationships through beautification initiatives or teaching English to school children appeals to you, talk with your LdM Advisor. Additionally, LdM students can sign up for a non-credit professional opportunity. Unlike internships, these opportunities are based upon the completion of a single experiential learning project arranged by LdM in collaboration with community partners and businesses. Students receive a certificate of participation upon successful completion of their professional opportunity project.
