Our well-balanced, integrated, and comparative approach explores the many sides of the Etruscan, Greek, Roman, and Near Eastern civilizations in the framework of long-term cultural and historical processes.

Our mission is to explore the field's fundamental themes and questions. With a critical eye, students learn to observe and analyze cultural and social phenomena such as religion, communicative strategies, and socio-political development from a historical and interdisciplinary vantage point, and relate what they have learned to the world of today.

Our dedicated, diverse faculty possess an expertise that cuts across a wide variety of disciplines. While Classics provides our foundation, the curriculum embraces subjects ranging from philosophy, government, and the arts to language, archaeology, and international studies. We also use modern theories and ideas, such as belief systems and hierarchies, to shed new light on the past and help connect it to our present.

Our exciting, fruitful collaboration with The Center for Ancient Mediterranean and Near Eastern Studies (CAMNES) and our Archaeology Lab (co-directed with CAMNES) further promote our goal of fostering an inclusive, dynamic educational environment where students can learn about and interact with our culture's ancient roots.

Art History and Visual Culture (ART)

We promote and build on Italy's long tradition of innovative artists and probing intellectual inquiry to explore the history of humanity through its art. To do so, we adopt a broad historical perspective, reaching from classical antiquity through the Renaissance and into the modern and contemporary eras. We aim to challenge historical canons, rethink the relationships between artistic expression and historical events and phenomena, and apply our knowledge and critical approach to the pursuit of a socially-responsible preservation of our cultural heritage.

Unparalleled access to Italian museums, festivals, artists, and great works of art-both past and present-provides a captivating, inspirational environment that is especially conducive to establishing a personal connection with art and the context in which it was created. Whether it's Renaissance sculpture, the nude in modern art, or museology, we bring students into direct contact with artistic masterpieces and world-class art institutions in and around the cities where they live and study.

Our interdisciplinary approach embraces the key contributions of other fields to art history, further enriching our course offering. Students gain an in-depth knowledge of the major figures and features of history's most important artistic movements, and investigate fascinating topics such as religious and secular symbolism in art, the history of patronage and collecting, and the evolution of the Italian villa and garden from antiquity to the present.

Communications (COM)

In a globalized world, Communications represents an increasingly important field of study. Its core concepts draw on the intellectual traditions and methods of inquiry of the social sciences, humanities, and the arts, making it an eminently interdisciplinary field with applications in every field of study.

Our goal is to empower students in a multicultural context: from theory to case studies to the sharing of knowledge in diverse working groups. We want to stimulate critical thinking by encouraging new ways of observing reality.

Via a sociological-anthropological approach, we investigate the methods for transmitting history and information, how the media influence our cultural identity and values, and how the latter are redefined through constant dialogue.

Students examine the principles of consumer behavior and apply research-based strategic planning to create integrated marketing campaigns for new and existing brands, analyze how digital technologies are shaping not only cultural and marketing strategies, but approaches to war, art, and scientific advancement, and explore our physical and emotional reactions to these phenomena as human beings. They also have the unique challenges and opportunities, such as designing websites and related digital content, and conducting immersive ethnographic studies in Florence's city center.

We are committed to advancing knowledge of our physical planet and the impact of humans on the environment, in order to better understand and promote the sustainability of life on earth. To do so, we adopt an interdisciplinary approach that provides students with the information, analytical skills and perspective required to be responsible global citizens, prepared to make valuable contributions to the future well-being of our world in a wide range of professional fields.

Our curriculum is designed to bring about a heightened awareness of the human impact on climate and ecosystems, the social and cultural aspects of the field, and the delicate geopolitical landscape.

Courses investigate the field's major themes and questions in the context of the most significant geographical, historical, and cultural features of Tuscany and its major sub-regions such as the Mugello, the Apennine Mountains, the Chianti, and the Maremma. Gender Studies (GND)

Our goal is to promote the thorough exploration and understanding of gender structures and representations, analyzing their impact on events, government policies, and culture.

Our dedicated faculty and mentors empower students in their daily lives, raising awareness of gender issues and how they influence our ideas of identity, race, class, and disability, and inspiring them to contribute to the contemporary struggle for social justice.

Courses range from an introduction to the field to the rethinking of traditional topics and subjects, such as the theory of evolution or the history of Medici family, through a gendered lens. We also examine some of the most prominent female characters and authors in 20th-Century European and American fiction.

Students are encouraged to explore and grapple critically with specific areas such as feminism, the politics of representation, gender and work, gender and health, and the media. Core courses provide students with the ability to analyze traditional social, cultural, religious and political structures in relation to the problem of gender bias.

Our rich curriculum explores questions such as the evolution of the European Union, powerful women of the Medici dynasty, daily life in Renaissance Florence, and the Catholic Church's role in Italian history and society. Students are trained to think historically, helping them gain a new perspective and depth of understanding of the world we live in.

Working with the diverse forms of historical evidence that archives, particularly in Florence, have conserved, students learn to understand and analyze primary sources, transforming their findings into persuasive arguments about key historical questions and their contemporary ramifications.

Literature (LIT)

We are committed to an international, interdisciplinary approach to literature and culture more generally. Our curriculum embraces a wide variety of themes and topics, including journalism and its ideas, theories of information, and the art of communication. We believe in the importance of exploring literary works in the broader context of artistic and cultural movements, and within the social and historical frameworks in which they were created.

Our dedicated faculty encourage students to dive into the key texts and developments across several major European bodies of literature from the Middle Ages to the present day. A particular focus is the comparative analysis of Italy's vast literary tradition, and the influences of English and European literature. We challenge cultural perceptions and stereotypes by analyzing both past and contemporary literature from a complex combination of geographical, historical, political, and linguistic perspectives. Students thus have the opportunity to look beyond the mainstream ideas of Italian culture, discovering previously marginalized literary figures and subjects. Literature is also a site for using stories as an expression of cultural traditions, an aspect we examine particularly with respect to the 14th-century Italian literary revolution.

Italian texts are studied alongside their English translations. Students develop advanced critical and analytical skills through special projects and narrative and temporal analyses.

Religious Studies (REL)

Religion has had a major role in shaping the human experience.

It has impacted history, literature, art, culture, politics, ethics, and economics. In collaboration with the School of Religious Studies (SoRS) at the Center for Ancient Mediterranean and Near Eastern Studies (CAMNES), we provide students with the tools for grappling with and understanding ancient and modern religions. Our interdisciplinary approach develops critical thinking skills and brings to light both the similarities and differences among world religious traditions. The result: better-informed, more nuanced thinkers capable of navigating the spiritual diversity of human cultures.

The curriculum emphasizes a comparative study of religions and their role in past and present societies. Students acquire a thorough grasp of fundamental topics such as the birth and evolution of Mediterranean-area religions, the role of monotheistic faiths in framing the modern world, and the importance of meditation in enhancing an individual's spiritual life. The aim is to find the means of creating a fruitful dialogue among world religions.

The faculty's interdisciplinary, multi-faceted teaching approach encourages the integration of pertinent, related perspectives from diverse fields (such as art history, archaeology, philosophy, architecture, and history) to deepen and enrich students' understanding of the world around them.

Sociology (SOC)

Sociology is the study of the organization of human groups, how they function, and how they develop over time. Its methods of inquiry offer powerful insight into the inner workings of the human society that shapes the lives of individuals and groups in the contemporary world, just as it did in eras past.

We introduce students to the major sociological theories and guide them in applying these frameworks to real-life situations. Our mission, in fact, is to pass on the scientific, interpretive and critical skills necessary to analyze the structures and forces that underlie human experience on a local and global scale.

Our courses are designed to promote the understanding of complex social and cultural realities, beginning with Italian society itself, then apply this know-how to other geographical and historical contexts. Through an in-depth critical analysis of economic factors and legislative policies, sociology gives students the tools to better understand the dynamics of questions of culture, race and ethnicity, as well as globalization and its effects, protest movements, media analysis, and social networks.
