Study Abroad Programs

Academic Semester and Year Abroad

Long-term programs are customizable based on students' academic needs and personal interests. LdM suggests students register for one course in Italian language, as these classes provide students with tools for navigating Italy and are part of the traditional study abroad experience. Additionally, semester students are eligible for credit-bearing internships in various fields of study, from Art History to Communications and Design.

Semester Internships

Italy is known for artisanal and small business structures. By dedicating 12 hours per week to an LdM partner company or organization, students gain familiarity with common characteristics of an Italian workplace while balancing a full semester of credits. LdM interns can obtain lifelong skills, cultivate relationships, and enhance resumes that help them compete in the global marketplace. Please note that placement opportunities are limited and are unpaid.

Two Italies Program

Instead of concentrating an entire semester in either Florence or Tuscania, experience both LdM sites with the Two Italies program! Living and studying in the city before transferring to the Italian countryside, students learn to recognize local and regional differences, and gain a more complex understanding of contemporary Italy. A set schedule of five courses introduces students to Italian language and culture, Florence's ancient roots, wine business and marketing, philosophical and psychological approaches to the subject of happiness, and global development of sustainable food sources. This program is ideal for undergraduates who want to fulfill general education requirements abroad.

Summer Sessions

In the summertime, LdM offers two shorter sessions, each consisting of month-long courses. Choose the Florence or Tuscania session that works better for your schedule, either June or July. Alternatively, students may combine the two sessions to maximize their summer study abroad in Italy.

January Intersession

The shortest of LdM programs, this three-week program in Florence is open to undergraduate and independent students, as well as lifelong learners. Capitalize on the winter break by enrolling in one or two courses that complement your international adventures in Tuscany's capital city, the Jewel of the Renaissance.

Special Programs

Available in both Florence and Tuscania, these 4-week intensive experiences balance academic instruction with hands-on practice.

Archaeology Field School (July)

Dig into a professional excavation environment while learning about ancient Etruscan culture and archaeological methods. Conducted in partnership with LdM's long-time partner CAMNES (The Center for Ancient Mediterranean and Near Eastern Studies), students will be led by a team of Italian archaeologists into Tuscania's necropolises, or cities of the dead, and delicately uncover artifacts dating back 2,500 years. This year, Italian students will participate as part of a collaboration with Università di Napoli Federico II.

Conservation Workshop (June & July)

Learn how to directly apply the most appropriate conservation and restoration techniques to authentic works of art in their historical Italian locations. Students practice the creative and scientific skills necessary to travel into the field and work in hands-on sessions that focus on original easel paintings, frescoes and wooden artifacts from past centuries. This workshop begins at the LdM restoration lab in Florence and continues to an off-site location in Italy for the remainder of the course. Past locations include ancient towns in Tuscany, Umbria, Calabria, and on the island of Capraia. This course is open to all levels and offers the unique opportunity to learn in a professional studio setting as well as the chance to study in an authentic Italian town.

Stop-Motion Workshop (June & July)

This newly introduced workshop introduces students to the cinematic art of stop-motion animation and takes place at the renowned Misseri Studio located in the stunning Castle of Montalbo in the nearby hills of Florence. Through hands-on learning, students learn the basics of creating stop-motion, such as creating and building characters, developing a storyboard, filming techniques, and post-production editing. While studying the evolving television and online market, and analyzing professional opportunities in the industry, students will also work as part of a team to create their own unique animations.

One-Year and Professional/Advanced Certificates



Marist-LdM Degree Programs

International students can earn a US bachelor's degree through LdM's partnership with Marist University. These fully accredited, four-year degree programs offer the unique experience of extended undergraduate study at an Italian international institution. Subjects include: Art History, Conservation Studies, Digital Media, Fashion Merchandising, Global Marketing Communication, Interior Design, Italian Language, and Fine Arts.

Marist-LdM Venice Biennale Program

This biennial summer program invites students to visit the famous visual art exhibition, La Biennale di Venezia. Academics focus on studio art and the prominent role that Italy plays in the contemporary art world.

Florence

Florence is the capital of the Tuscany region and home to approximately one-third of the world's art treasures. Living and studying in the birthplace of the Renaissance is an unparalleled experience! Walking to classes in Florence's historical center, the entirety of which is declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site, LdM students enjoy jewels of the city, marvel at its beauty, and make meaningful memories every day.

Study in Style

LdM buildings are situated in the San Lorenzo district, next to the bustling market and ancient church. The LdM Florence campus comprises 16 properties peppered among the iconic Duomo, artisanal gelaterias, and Renaissance palaces. In addition, LdM partners with the University of Florence, enabling students to complete STEM coursework in the same laboratory facilities utilized by Italian university students. LdM students will appreciate a full range of facilities: Wi-Fi equipped classrooms, specialized art and design studios, modern culinary labs, a courtyard garden, a library, and a computer center.

Delight in Culinary Arts

LdM's main building neighbors the lively Mercato Centrale, one of the city's oldest indoor markets. Since 1874, locals have depended on this historic public market for the fresh, colorful ingredients commonly used in Tuscan cuisine. In the newly restructured food hall on the second floor, among contemporary culinary vendors, students and tourists alike can discover Cucina LdM, a modern kitchen with 16 professional workstations equipped with state-of-the-art appliances.

Immerse Yourself in Aesthetic

Florence is a favorite destination for high street fashion, architecture, and style. Luxury brands, from Ferragamo and Gucci to Cavalli and Pucci, have made the city a fashion capital of the world, and Florence enjoys a reputation for quality craftsmanship and design. Curiosity and creativity are not restricted to students who major in art and design. LdM encourages all students to deepen their understanding of fine arts, design industries, and Italy's cultural heritage

through a variety of introductory, intermediate, and advanced courses.

Exhibit with LdM Gallery

Studying in Florence, students find beauty around every corner and within the LdM Gallery. Programming often focuses on student perspectives with exhibitions that feature the most exciting and profound interdisciplinary art and design projects by LdM's very own students. Frequent exhibitions generate open discussion with the public and offer students the chance to experience professional realities of the art world beyond an institutional setting.

Visit Fondazione Zeffirelli

In 2018, LdM began a rewarding collaboration with Fondazione Franco Zeffirelli - International Center for Performing Arts. The Center makes the heritage of Franco Zeffirelli's 70-year career in opera, film, and theater available to future generations, Florentine and international alike. Courses in the performing arts, film and media arts, and literature are jointly offered by LdM and Fondazione Zeffirelli inside the beautiful Palazzo San Firenze, a 17th-century baroque architectural treasure.

Tuscania

Situated in central Italy's Lazio region, Tuscania is a beautiful hilltop town, where LdM students live and study in an authentic Italian environment, while interacting closely with the resident community.

Magical Location

The small town is surrounded by a rural landscape of cultivated farms, olive trees and grazing sheep. And everywhere they turn, students find themselves amidst 2,500 years of unbroken history. Tuscania lies not far from the sea and three scenic freshwater lakes.

A Close-knit Community

LdM Tuscania is a convivial campus, where students, faculty and staff get to know each other well and collaborate closely. Classrooms and student facilities are all in one building, just inside the town's medieval walls. People from Tuscania also welcome LdM students warmly. Students buy their food from family-owned fruit and veg shops, bakeries, cheese stores, and butchers.

They experience how the numerous cafés and restaurants act as essential meeting points for the town. LdM students share organized activities with students from the local community, re-meeting casually at live music events at the weekend.

The Old and the New

The center is rich with culture: art and dance studios, theaters, a gym, a museum, a lovely library, and beautiful parks to relax in. There are many churches, each with its own architectural style. Students experience European heritage directly: the spiritually profound Etruscans, the engineering marvels of the Ancient Romans, the wealth of Medieval and Renaissance times. Outside the walls there is a newer Tuscania: an easily walkable town that is a vibrant part of contemporary Italy.

Immersion, Slow-Life and Sustainability

Students find it easy to practice their Italian - at any level - in Tuscania because they are not surrounded by tourists and are in direct contact with the locals. It is also an ideal place for students to study agriculture, the Mediterranean diet, European history, to draw and paint, and to find out about sustainability. Hiking, swimming, and visiting the neighboring towns by bus offer students a safe and relaxing way to balance their academic courses with unforgettable moments of wellbeing.

Getting Around

LdM staff help students gain confidence planning weekend trips further afield. Since Tuscania is not on the trainline, LdM offers free transfers on Thursdays or Fridays to Tarquinia station. On Sundays, students can return to Tarquinia train station for a free transfer back to Tuscania. From Tarquinia station students can travel to anywhere in Europe, either via the rail system or the airports near Rome, which are less than two hours away.



Florence is a city of just under 400,000 residents and the capital of the Tuscany region. The birthplace of the Renaissance, Florence houses many of Western art's greatest masterpieces, including Michelangelo's David and Botticelli's The Birth of Venus.



Tuscania is a charming, hilltop town of 10,000 inhabitants located in the Lazio region, south of Florence and north of Rome. A gem of natural and cultural beauty, Tuscania is known for its rich history, medieval architecture, and stunning countryside.

Housing

Studying abroad is a transformative experience and requires students to adjust to a new way of life in a different country. LdM makes this transition easier by offering a range of housing services for those who choose Italy as their home away from home.

Students who apply for LdM Housing have the opportunity to express their needs in their LdM Housing Application. The LdM Housing Services staff carefully considers this information and strives to accommodate requests, such as roommate or apartment-mate preferences and room type preferences (single or double occupancy), whenever possible.

However, specific housing types (e.g., shared apartment vs. student hotel or residences) are assigned by LdM based on availability. Given the variety of accommodations that may be available, students should remain open to placements in shared rooms.

LdM Accommodations

Florence: LdM housing in Florence consists of a shared double or triple room – or a single room, when available and upon request – within a shared student apartment, or a shared double or a single room in a student hotel or residence. All options are located within the city of Florence.

Tuscania: LdM housing in Tuscania consists of a shared double room or a single room within a shared student apartment. All apartments are located within the town of Tuscania.

Regardless of the site, all LdM accommodations are non-smoking, have access to Wi-Fi and are equipped with air conditioning or portable AC during summer months.

Shared Student Apartments (Florence & Tuscania)

LdM offers shared student apartments in both Florence and Tuscania. Apartments in Italy are often situated in antique buildings and will surely differ from those in the student's home country. They are most often on the second floor (or higher) within buildings that likely do not have an elevator or elevator access. Each apartment is unique in layout, style, lighting, and features.

All apartments are fully furnished and equipped with bed linens, towels, pots and pans, kitchen utensils, basic appliances, washing machine, and TV.

Student Hotel (Florence)

LdM has partnered with selected Student Hotels in the city of Florence to provide dedicated student housing with high standards of comfort and functionality. These recently renovated rooms (singles or doubles) are specifically designed to support academic life and student interaction. The accommodations are fully equipped with essential services, including a shared kitchen facility, cleaning, laundry services, bed linens, and towels.

Residences (Florence)

LdM collaborates with select residences in the city of Florence, offering a combination of student hotel and apartment-style accommodations. These residences typically feature small apartments with kitchenettes, along with essential amenities such as laundry (if a washing machine is not in the living space), reception services, and cleaning. The variety of residence types ensures a flexible and comfortable living experience for students.

Homestays

Living with a host or host family is an experience that offers students linguistic and cultural benefits while gaining a deeper understanding of Italy and its people. Being part of a household means participating directly in everyday Italian routines and building life-long bonds with hosts. Homestays are especially recommended to students committed to learning Italian.

Most Italians live in apartments, so students can expect to live in apartment-style housing with their hosts, and apartment features will vary by placement. LdM homestay assignments typically consist of a double occupancy bedroom. Single occupancy bedrooms are available upon request but limited in number.

Please Note: Students are not obligated to choose housing through LdM; however, some home institutions require study abroad students to live in LdM housing.



Student Life

Providing a necessary complement to the rich and varied academic content at its two campuses, LdM's dependable team of advisors guides students to a deeper understanding of the Italian lifestyle, language, culture, and customs. Co-curricular learning is facilitated through recreational activities, student clubs, volunteer opportunities, and excursions. After all, no study abroad experience is complete without fun and adventure!



Student Activity

Student Services

Every student receives constant support from an assigned LdM Advisor. Whether requesting a restaurant recommendation or referral to academic resources, students can rely on their LdM Advisor. In addition, LdM Advisors assist students with accessing local health care and navigating international insurance. Upon arrival in Italy, LdM's 24/7 emergency phone number is shared during orientation in case a student needs to speak with an advisor for any urgent reason outside of business hours. Mental health services are also available to LdM students at no additional cost, and appointments with certified counselors are easily booked online.

Cafeteria

Every student receives constant support at the LdM Florence main building, students can enjoy freshly cooked meals, including daily vegetarian options. A meal plan card of 10 meals plus one free meal is available. LdM Tuscania offers students a student card which provides discounts at some local cafes and restaurants.

Student Point

All LdM sites offer students free access to computing and internet facilities as well as wireless internet connectivity.
